



"Have you ever wondered what would happen if we put a giant drain in the middle of ocean? Or what would happen if your DNA disappeared? Or what consequences we would face if the moon suddenly went away? If any of these questions piqued your

curiosity, then *What if*? is for you! This book of 'serious scientific answers to absurd hypothetical questions' is full of just that. It *really* explains what would happen using scientific explanations, equations, and illustrations. I'm not sure if there's a use for any of the information I learned from this book, but I definitely feel smarter after reading it! Munroe explores complex topics like physics, genetics, chemistry, probability, quantum technology & much more that is way beyond anything I'd normally read. 

"Otter is the most comfortable at sea with her fathers on their ship 'Tempest', where they do secret work for the Queen. The kingdom is not at rest, though; there is a growing society of homeless children underneath the surface of the cities, and they are blaming the Queen. When street kid London stows away on the Tempest, he gets caught up in the political turmoil coming to a head. The prologue sets up the fantasy aspects of the book, with the first chapters grounded in a society that feels more 'normal' until everything is fully integrated. Otter and London are both likable characters who have great people around

them. The characters feel like people - they have fully realized lives, even if we only see snippets of them. There is a lot of richness here that could expand into more books set in this universe. 'The Hidden Dragon' is somewhat slower paced than other middle-grade titles. It wasn't boring, but the tension wasn't at a fever pitch the entire story. Each month, I take one historical image & photograph it superimposed over the same area as it appears today. This allows you to see what Venango County looked like in the past with a modern reference. My hope is to share neat photos from the library's archives to make them and their history more attainable.



The Evening News had its beginnings in the back rooms of offices where it was headquartered and the type was set. The young men who started the newspaper in 1878 would then take their type forms to an existing newspaper's shop to finish the job. One of those men, James Borland, remained here in the newspaper business until his death. As the city of Franklin flourished, a new building was constructed on the corner of 12th and Liberty Streets to house all of the paper's operations. The building opened in 1911 and was home to Franklin newspapers for the next 50 years.

Last month, we outlined our stance on maximizing access for all library users. Now, we'll explain how we fulfill that mission: through connections.

Similar to other offerings, we attempt to make connections through multiple service options. Particular resources can fulfill multiple connection points. People are often surprised when they learn of specific resources and services we provide that may not fit their understanding of a library. In these cases, people are typically focused on the actual product provided while we are focused on WHY we would offer something. We'll focus our connection points out into several key areas:

To Information & Resources

Here is where the classical understanding and expectations of public libraries generally resonates with just about everyone. When you think of libraries, "books" is almost certainly one of the first words that comes to mind. Books, along with digital resources, internet access, STEM kits, bus routes, & much more all connect our users with important information and resources. If something meets that criteria, regardless of format, we'll consider it for our services.

To Each Other

Libraries play a critical role in connecting people to each other. In recent years, we've all witnessed first-hand how valuable it is to remain connected with one another and the loss that comes from being separated for significant periods of time. By providing public programs, informal gathering spaces, & backyard games (to name a few) we are encouraging human-to-human connections.

To Your Local Community

Being engaged with your local community starts with being informed about it. We provide our space to other community groups, promote a wide array of area events and activities while also participating directly in a number of them. We also document and retain local history resources to provide access for future generations.
