

FODOR'S ESSENTIAL ICELAND

FODOR'S TRAVEL



"After two years of postponements due to the COVID-19 pandemic, I was able to eventually travel in the summer of 2022 with my children and granddaughters to mythic and fabulous Iceland, an island nation abutting the Arctic Circle in the North Atlantic Ocean. The natural scenery of the country is quite diverse, and overflows with the grandeur and splendor of (literally) thousands of waterfalls, scores of volcanoes, hundreds of mountains, & dozens of glaciers. Since

returning, I've described Iceland to others as seeing the mystery and magnificence of some other planet, where the air is pure, the water everywhere is deliciously drinkable, and where nearly all of the inhabitants speak (excellent) English. *Fodor's Travel Guide, Essential Iceland* provides an up-to-date summary of potential experiences for the Icelandic traveler - including lodging, suggested restaurants, tour services, festivals, shopping, museums, and special sights. It is, of course, not possible for a guidebook to include all of the possibilities, even in a country as small as Iceland, but it was my experience that many of the most delightful aspects of the trip came from serendipitous discoveries in small villages and less visited areas of the island. *Fodor's Guide* is reasonably well organized, and includes fairly good maps of Iceland's various geographic areas. Compared with other travel guides I've used, I was pleased that *Fodor's* included descriptions of public swimming pools throughout the country (nearly every town, village, and hamlet has at least one pool, usually two - an indoor and an outdoor.) Like with most Iceland guide books, the 'Blue Lagoon' is a highly touted, must experience destination. It is my opinion that if you wish to visit a geothermal lagoon there are many other choices - less hyped, less crowded, and a lot cheaper." – *Randy Stewart, Volunteer at Franklin Public Library*




PEPPER & ME

In order to deal with being stuck with a huge scab on her knee, our main character eventually gives it a name and treats it as an imaginary friend until the scab goes away. We follow our

character from her initial injury until the scab eventually comes off. Along the way, we see how she deals with being self conscious about it & realizes that other people also get hurt and have to deal with the aftermath too. The artwork is also gorgeous in this - the drawings look like a child has done them, but also make the characters feel like real people with their own lives outside of our main characters. 
