



HARDTACK & COFFEE *** OR. THE UNWRITTEN STORY OF ARMY LIFE

JOHN D. BILLINGS

Most histories of the Civil War focus on battles & top brass. Hardtack & Coffee is one of the few to give a vivid, detailed picture of what ordinary soldiers endured every day--in camp, on the march, at the edge of a booming, smoking hell. John D. Billings of Massachusetts enlisted in the Army of the Potomac & survived the conditions he recorded. The authenticity of his book is heightened by the many drawings that a comrade, Charles W. Reed, made in the field. This is the story of how the Civil War soldier was recruited, provisioned, & disciplined. Described here are the types of men found in any outfit; their not very uniform uniforms; crowded tents & makeshift shelters; difficulties

in keeping clean, warm, & dry; their pleasure in a cup of coffee; food rations, dominated by salt pork & the versatile cracker or hardtack; their brave pastimes in the face of death; punishments for various offenses; treatment in sick bay; firearms & signals, & modes of transportation. Comprehensive & anecdotal, Hardtack & Coffee is striking for the pulse of life that runs through it.

"Most Civil War books take a broad view & talk about the battles or the reasons behind them, or even the economic & cultural effects it had on our country. All of this is good, but I've found very few that focus on the day-to-day life of the people that aren't sensationalized into fiction or are incredibly dry. Billings' book is an exception. It follows the day-to-day life & concerns of a Union soldier entertainingly & plainly. Billings is more telling a story than writing a book, & it comes across in his words. The numerous illustrations also make it a fun read. Anyone who has a passing interest in the Civil War, or just American history in general, would find it entertaining." 


Airplane Mode

Nearing Completion

Carnegie Theater to Officially Open in 2026

For the past 7 months, Perry Construction has been restoring Library Hall, the historic theater on the 2nd floor of the Oil City Library. Finishing touches on the floor, bathrooms & lighting are being made & the space will be ready for private bookings in 2026. We're so excited to hold our first official event, *The Gatsby Ball*, in the space later this month! A rock concert, film showing & opera performance are also slated for this Fall in the space.

Enormous sliding barn doors hide the catering space at the rear of the hall.



The catering space behind the sliding barn doors in the rear of the hall features a sink, mini fridge & counter space to accommodate events like wedding receptions, reunions, parties & other gatherings.



Original hardwood flooring has been sanded, stained & varnished.



Light bulbs line the ceiling arches, stretching the width of the hall, leading to the stage.



Wall sconces, with original plaster designs (coming soon!), sit at the bottom of the ceiling arches.



Original stained glass windows and trim are restored to their original glory.


Love 'The Great Gatsby' & looking for similar reads?

Rules of Civility AMOR TOWLES




A Prayer for Owen Meany 🥃


